Interview Candidates for Agricultural Marketing and Quantitative Analysis Position

Their seminars are scheduled for 9:30a.m., Monday and Thursday, and there are two open meetings for faculty at 10:45a.m. & 1:30p.m., each of those days, all in AGLS 301. Round Table Luncheon

On Tuesday, the Center on Conflict and Development and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences co-hosted a round table luncheon with **Dr. Echeveria** as the guest speaker to discuss the "Global Food Systems, for Health, Prosperity and Sustainability". **Dr. Ed Price** brought Dr. Echeverria by my office earlier in the day which worked out well for me since I had a schedule conflict and could not make the luncheon discussion. Dr. Echeverria is a Sr. Research Fellow at the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) based in Washington DC; and a Research Associate (non-resident) at the Latin-American Center for Rural Development (RIMISP) based in Santiago, Chile and is a Director General Emeritus of the International Center for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT) based in Cali, Colombia. He worked in agricultural, environmental and rural development issues for more than a decade at the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) in Washington, D.C. where he led the creation of FONTAGRO. He is currently the Chair of the Scientific Advisory Board of the Catalan Institute of Food and Agricultural Research and Technology (IRTA).

Agribusiness Entrepreneurship Mentoring Forum

On Friday of this week and next week, rural entrepreneurship AGEC 425 students will be participating in the **Kathi** and **Murray '73 Edwards Agribusiness Entrepreneurship Mentoring Forum**. Approximately 35 students will be meeting with volunteer mentors to discuss their projects and received input and feedback. The students present a two to three-minute introductory discussion to use in familiarizing mentors with their project, and then spend 15-20 minutes in discussions with mentors. The principal learning objectives are for the students to learn the process for evaluating a business idea and to effectively evaluate and communicate the results of their analyses.

Tenured: Professor and Department Head. The Department of Agricultural Economics, College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Texas A&M University invites applications for a full-time tenured position with a service period of 9-month academic appointment beginning June 1, 2020. Candidates for the Tenured Professor and Department Head position must have an earned doctorate in Agricultural Economics or a closely related field, with a record of distinction in research, teaching and service that would qualify them for tenure at a tier 1 research institution. Applicants must submit the following documents: 1) a cover letter; 2) a detailed curriculum vita; 3) a personal research statement; 4) a statement of administrative philosophy; 5) a statement of vision for the Department, specifically addressing undergraduate and graduate education, faculty mentoring, the fostering of academic research programs across multiple disciplines, extension outreach, the advancement of diversity, and a strategy for development (fundraising); and 6) contact information for five referees. Assistant Professor, University of Connecticut, Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics. This position will provide expertise and leadership in research and extension programing with a focus on one or more of the following: agribusiness, production, labor, or regional economics. The successful candidate will have 35% extension, 35% research, and 30% teaching duties with an anticipated start date of August 23, 2020 in a full-time, nine-month tenure-track position. Minimum qualifications include a Ph.D. in Agricultural Economics, Economics, or a related field; excellent oral and written communication skills; advanced training or demonstrable research experience in the economics of agriculture, agribusiness, and/or food, including related areas such as health, the environment, business policy; excellent training in microeconomic theory and empirical methods; and ability to teach economics and business courses with an emphasis on agriculture and food.
